It is the simple, but profound secret at the heart of what each of you strive to awaken in your students:


Service to others without expectation of reward is what gives life true meaning. Or, to put it another way, real happiness lies in making others happy.


The acceptance of this, I have to tell you, is a bit of an out of body experience for me, I just can't quite relate to it. But it is lovely and I thank you and appreciate it.



In the early part of my life, I thought of myself as a grain of sand on the beach and my job would be to polish up my grain of sand.


I knew every grain of sand affects all the other grains.

WISCONSIN CHARACTER EDUCATION PARTNERSHIP

After some successes, CEP determined with the encouragement of the Templeton Foundation, to decentralize CEP efforts to the states.

States tended to focus on State Schools of Character awards. We went to the educators and asked them what they wanted. They said just give us credit for what we are doing.

WCEP chose some seven years ago to develop Promising Practices Awards, encouraging schools to begin the journey. Then we began the Wisconsin Call to Character, and State Schools of Character, followed by Leadership Academy for Character Education known as LACE. All of this was built so that others could learn from it. We synergized existing volunteers, educators, community organizations and associations around improving school cultures/character education.

It goes without saying, but I have to say it anyway. Teachers are an extraordinary, important part of our country.



Our Founders, as you know, studied the hundred failed city/states democracies of the Roman Era. They determined they failed because of a lack of virtue. They concluded we must have virtue in the nation for our democracy to survive long-term.



Then, the Jefferson Adams debate which questioned whether we should be - "A religious state or if we should have freedom of religion." They thought the "source of virtue" was nurtured by religion.

Later years the beginning of public education mandate "prepare our children to be virtuous citizens."

Let me move to the people who are on the front lines with our children every day and are so essential to the success of character education. Teachers and their school environments.

I've never interviewed anybody in my life that is a really high performing professional who didn't have an influential teacher early in their life. As I interviewed these folks, I said, there's no way their teacher knew at the time they had that student in their classroom, that as a teacher they would have that kind of effect. Your intentions and how you walked was understood, came from the heart.

So, whenever I'm with a group of teachers, I always have to applaud them, and remind them, they just don't know how or where they are going to affect a young person. Your disposition, your affirmation, the way in which you conduct yourself in your classroom, how you treat your students one way or another, sooner or later affect how this student is going to journey into life.

I began pursuing how best to help create citizens of character by asking what would be the most effective way to meet them early and often. I realized that the least privileged in our society all go to school even though they may not graduate. All American kids spend years in a school. So, I thought if the school was one of the National Schools of Character, those children's lives would be profoundly better and they would have a reference for the rest of their life because of each of you, I thank you.

Let me point out something sort of strange. The teaching profession is not very kind to itself, or especially in terms of how they think others view them.
